CONSENSUS AGREEMENT RESPECTING IMPLEMENTATION OF THE RECOVERY STRATEGY FOR WOOD BISON IN THE NWT

The Conference of Management Authorities has reached consensus (hereafter referred to as the "Consensus Agreement") respecting the implementation of the *Recovery Strategy for Wood Bison (Bison bison athabascae) in the Northwest Territories*.

Recognizing the ecological role of wood bison and their importance to people – the cultural and spiritual values of bison combined with their consumptive and non-consumptive uses – the goals of this recovery strategy are to: (1) recover free-ranging, genetically diverse, and healthy wood bison populations broadly distributed within the Northwest Territories (NWT), to levels which can sustain ongoing harvest for the benefit of all people in the NWT and (2) contribute to the recovery of free-ranging, healthy wood bison populations in Canada. The recommended recovery approaches and the Management Authorities' intent to undertake them are summarized in this Consensus Agreement. Further information can be found in the *Recovery Strategy for Wood Bison (Bison bison athabascae) in the Northwest Territories*.

Implementation is subject to appropriations, priorities, and budgetary constraints of the Management Authorities.

The processes for developing the recovery strategy and this Consensus Agreement are outlined in Annex B.

GNWT Statements

The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) makes the following statements about its intentions to implement the recommended approaches in the recovery strategy, subject to appropriations, priorities, and budgetary constraints.

- A. Implementation Underway** – The GNWT is actively implementing a number of the recommended approaches in the recovery strategy in whole or in part. Many of these actions are long-term and progress is made gradually over time. The actions are being implemented with co-management partners as part of ongoing management, monitoring, research, conservation planning, and environmental assessment programs. The recommendations in the wood bison recovery strategy provide advice to help guide these programs. This statement applies to recommended approaches 1.2, 2.1, 2.3, 3.1, 3.2, and 5.2.
- B. Resources Required** - A number of the recommended approaches in the recovery strategy are important but implementing them would require additional resources and/or re-allocation of existing resources. The GNWT intends to pursue implementation of these approaches as resources and capacity allow. The GNWT will seek additional resources and may consider re-allocation of existing resources to implement these approaches. Re-allocation of existing resources could affect other commitments. This applies to recommended approaches 3.3, 3.4, 3.6, 4.1, and 4.2.
- C. Not Pursuing** – Some approaches in the recovery strategy are more appropriately led by co-management partners other than the GNWT, and some approaches are not currently a high priority for the GNWT to implement given other higher priorities and resource constraints. The GNWT does not intend to actively pursue implementing these approaches at this time. This does not prevent the GNWT from participating in implementation if opportunities arise and/or when other management partners take a lead role. This applies to recommended approaches 2.2, 3.5, and 5.1.
- D. Completed** – Approach 1.1 was completed after the recovery strategy was published but before the consensus agreement on implementation was signed.

Tłı̨chǫ Government Statements

Tłı̨chǫ Government staff have been involved and supported the development of the *Recovery Strategy for Wood Bison in the NWT* (recovery strategy) and the Chief's Executive Council of the Tłı̨chǫ Government approved the recovery strategy. With respect to the recovery strategy and subject to appropriations, priorities, and budgetary constraints, implementation will be a collaborative effort. The Tłı̨chǫ Government will identify which recommended approaches as set out in Annex A will be implemented by the Tłı̨chǫ Government to assist in the achievement of recovery objectives for wood bison in Wek'èezhìi and Mǫwhì Gogha Dè Nijłłèè.

Wek'èezhìi Renewable Resources Board Statements

With respect to the *Recovery Strategy for Wood Bison in the NWT*, the Wek'èezhìi Renewable Resources Board will implement the identified management approaches for the Mackenzie population only.

INTERPRETATION

For greater certainty, terms and processes in this Consensus Agreement are as defined and described in the *Species at Risk (NWT) Act*.

For greater certainty, the Management Authorities for wood bison (*Bison bison athabascae*) in the Northwest Territories are: Tłı̨chǫ Government, Wek'èezhìi Renewable Resources Board, and the Government of the Northwest Territories.

WE THE UNDERSIGNED, having reached this consensus on this 24th day of April 2020, provide this Consensus Agreement to the Minister of Environment and Natural Resources, Government of the Northwest Territories, the Wek'èezhìi Renewable Resources Board, and the Tłı̨chǫ Government.



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ANNEX B

DEVELOPMENT OF RECOVERY STRATEGY AND IMPLEMENTATION AGREEMENT

On July 13, 2017, the Minister of Environment and Natural Resources (ENR), Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT), acting on the direction provided by the Conference of Management Authorities in their *Consensus Agreement on Listing Wood Bison (Bison bison athabascae)* (April 2017), added wood bison to the NWT List of Species at Risk as a Threatened species. A recovery strategy was developed by the Conference of Management Authorities to address the recovery requirements of wood bison in the NWT. The recovery strategy includes appropriate recommended objectives and approaches for the conservation and recovery of wood bison in the NWT, as well as descriptions of threats and positive influences, as required under section 61 of the *Species at Risk (NWT) Act*. The recovery strategy was completed on July 29, 2019, in accordance with subsection 60(1) and sections 65-58 of the *Species at Risk (NWT) Act*.

This *Consensus Agreement Respecting Implementation of the Recovery Strategy for Wood Bison (Bison bison athabascae) in the Northwest Territories* was informed by discussions of the Conference of Management Authorities, the recovery strategy, the *Consensus Agreement on Listing Wood Bison (Bison bison athabascae)*, the *Consensus Agreement on Accepting the Recovery Strategy for Wood Bison (Bison bison athabascae) in the Northwest Territories*, the Species at Risk Committee's assessment and reasons for assessment, and the approved species status report. It was also informed by public input (solicited by the Management Authorities) and the results of Crown consultation duties performed by the GNWT during the listing process and the development of the recovery strategy. No information was provided to the Species at Risk Committee by the Conference of Management Authorities or a Management Authority under paragraph 31(1)(c) of the *Species at Risk (NWT) Act*.
