# ANNUAL REPORT

Under subsection 16(1) of the *Species at Risk (NWT) Act*, the Conference of Management Authorities (the Conference) must submit an annual report to the Minister of Environment and Climate Change by September 30 each year. This annual report covers the fiscal year ending March 31, 2024.

## THE SPECIES AT RISK (NWT) ACT

The *Species at Risk (NWT) Act* provides a process to identify, protect and recover species at risk in the Northwest Territories (NWT). The Act applies to any wild animal, plant, or other species that is managed by the Government of the Northwest Territories. It applies in most areas of the NWT, on both public and private lands, including private lands owned under a land claim agreement.

## PROGRESS APRIL 1, 2023 TO MARCH 31, 2024

The Conference of Management Authorities held three meetings during the 2023-2024 fiscal year.

**The Conference accomplished the following tasks:**

## Consensus Agreements

Completed and submitted to the Minister of Environment and Climate Change the following consensus agreements:

- **Northern mountain caribou** – Consensus agreement accepting the management plan for northern mountain caribou in the NWT.
- **Boreal caribou** – Consensus agreement on re-listing boreal caribou as a Threatened species.
- **Peary caribou** – Consensus agreement on re-listing Peary caribou as a Threatened species.

## Recovery Strategies and Management Plans

- Completed the progress report for the management of Dolphin and Union caribou in the NWT.
- Initiated work to develop the progress report for the recovery of wood bison in the NWT.

## Species Conservation and Recovery Fund

Awarded approximately \$60,000 in funding to five projects for 2024-25:

- Community-led Species at Risk Detection: eDNA Sampling in Traditionally Important Water Bodies of the North Slave Region (North Slave Métis Alliance)
- Collared Pika Education and Awareness Project (Ecology North)
- Post-fire Status of Reptiles and Amphibians in the NWT (Thompson Rivers University)
- Monitoring and Protection of Athabasca Denesųłiné Nuhenéné and Etthën (caribou) using Denesųłiné traditional protocols (Athabasca Denesųłiné Né Né Land Corporation)
- Northern Whooping Crane Festival (Fort Smith Métis Council)

# THE CONFERENCE OF MANAGEMENT AUTHORITIES

The Conference, established under the Act, is made up of the wildlife co-management boards and governments in the NWT that share responsibility for the conservation and recovery of species at risk in the NWT (Management Authorities). The Conference builds consensus among Management Authorities on the conservation of species at risk and provides direction, coordination and leadership with respect to the assessment, listing, conservation and recovery of species at risk while respecting the roles and responsibilities of Management Authorities under land claim and self-government agreements.

The Management Authorities are:

- Wildlife Management Advisory Council (NWT)
- Gwich'in Renewable Resources Board
- Ɂehdzo Got'ɁnɁ Gots'Ɂ NákedɁ (Sahtú Renewable Resources Board)
- Wek'èezhì Renewable Resources Board
- Tłıchq Government
- Government of Canada
- Government of the Northwest Territories

Each Management Authority may have three representatives attend Conference meetings. The Acho Dene Koe First Nation, Akaitcho Territory Government, Athabasca Denesųliné, Beverly and Qamanirjuaq Caribou Management Board, Dehcho First Nations, Kátł'odeeche First Nation, North Slave Métis Alliance, Northwest Territory Métis Nation and Salt River First Nation are also invited to observe or participate in Conference meetings.

The Conference develops consensus agreements on listing species at risk, conservation measures, management plans and recovery strategies. The Conference also reviews management plans and recovery strategies every five years and reports on progress toward meeting objectives.
